My failure to return to Haskell to finish my education has again prompted me to write and see if there isn't a way to arrange for me at any time so I could study business at the Commercial dept. at Haskell, either now or the second semester. If not is there any chance next year. I read in the Indian Leader where ^{some more} Commercial students were accepted.

I was talking to Supt. W. K. Meyer of the Colville Indian Agency and we could not come to no conclusion so he asked me to try my luck again

in writing a heart to heart talk to you.

If there was any funds in the family, they could send me to a business college at Spokane, But there isn't. I have just my mother to support me, my father being dead our plans could not carry out very well especially in this depression.

~~It~~ Probably you don't know that I was a student at Haskell two years and graduated from high school. I worked under Miss Hatfield in the Library. I got a round trip ticket last year, on the day I was leaving from my Grandma's place at Ellensburg, I left my purse on the car while passing time away before my departure my purse was stolen including my ^{transportation} ticket as it was in the purse.

We tried every ~~way~~ way to remove it and even tried to have another made so I could return but every thing I tried failed. and now I failed to be there again.

Miss Arnold could tell you I had good standing, I was an officer. Even just sergeant of Co. E.

I think I have every thing for your consideration, I was the first Indian girl to graduate from here, I have a good name in this town and I mingle with white mostly except my little family.

I wrote a letter before but I did not get an answer.
